

Audubon Council of New York State

A meeting of the Audubon Council of New York State was held in Albany, N.Y. The Council is composed of all of the Audubon Chapters in New York State. This was the second meeting since our new Regional Office was established last year. In attendance were twenty-seven out of the thirty-three state Chapters.

At this meeting by-laws were adopted and officers elected. Major topics were the Wetlands Campaign being organized by National Audubon Society, water issues concerning both the Great Lakes and Long Island Sound, and the 1990 Land Acquisition Bond Act Proposal. There was also an address by our newly nominated National Audubon Society Board Member, Bill Ross, who was elected by the Chapters last fall. The Councils provide the opportunity for state wide Chapters to share information and act on common causes.



THE SANDHILL CRANES NEED YOUR HELP

The Platte River is the primary staging area for literally millions of migrating birds each year. The Big Bend area, a stretch of the Platte in Nebraska, is visited each spring by approximately 500,000 Sandhill Cranes (80% of the world's Sandhill Crane population). It's the only stretch of suitable habitat left for them. A half a million of these creatures converging on this one small area is an amazing wildlife spectacle.

The Platte is fed by the North Platte in Wyoming, and the South Platte in Colorado. The Platte is already degraded due to damming on the North Platte. Now it's threatened by further degradation from a proposed dam on the South Platte, the Two Forks Dam. Almost half the water from the proposed dam would go to Denver lawns, while the loss of water flow would be disasterous to the critical bird habitat downriver.

EPA Director, Rielly has (with the President's support) challenged the project, and begun veto proceedings. The veto procedure has many steps, and could get hung up along the way.

WE CAN HELP!! To help assure these proceedings will go through, that the Two Forks project will be vetoed, we need to show our support. Please send letters to President Bush, and Mr. Lee DeHihns, head of the EPA in Colorado. Simply state that you support the veto of the project. Water conservation and appropriate landscaping techniques are better alternatives to damming the South Platte, which would destroy this critical wildlife habitat. Please help.

ALASKAN REFUGE STILL IN PERIL

The Exxon Valdez has provided a break from the pressure to destroy the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge through exploration, but this pristine area is far from safe. It's during this time that we on the preservation side of the battle can apply our own pressure.

I strongly urge you to write your Senators and your Representative, and tell them you are against development. Tell them a 19% chance that the oil companies might find 7 months supply of oil is not worth destroying this globally unique ecosystem. Urge them to support bills S39 and HR39 (Senate and House respectively) which would give the Refuge wilderness status, protecting it from development.

We've gotten more time to fight this, but you can be sure that big oil has not been dormant. They have big bucks backing strong lobbying--we need, each and every one of us, to take a stand and be heard. It's the only way we can win. 






Protect these peace loving mermaids from speeding motorboat propellers, automatic canal locks, pollution, and dredging and filling of their habitat.
